Course Description:

This course is intended to provide college-level education in Korean history from antiquity to 1900. It will locate Korea before its division to South and North Korea in world history, comparing its developments and historical evolution with East Asian neighbors, China and Japan, and the West. Students are expected to understand how time has determined Korea as one unit of a human civilization and how Korea has found its way for survival, prosperity, and self-determination in the dangerous world. Being the vortex of regional politics, economy, and military hegemony, the history of Korea can give students deeper insights on past, present, and future of East Asia.

Course Organization:

Lectures and seven afternoon excursions to historical sites in Seoul. Short writing assignments and representations after the visit. Mid-term and final exams.

Evaluation:

Attendance (20%), Short writing assignment & representations (30%), Mid-term exam (25%), Final exam (25%).
